Greg Platt moved to adjourn. Ken Tubman seconded, all agreed, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.



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

I am a first-time Porsche owner, having purchased a 2007 911 Carrera in February of last year. My family (wife Cindy and son Patrick) had already planned a trip to Germany in late June to visit the family of a German exchange student we hosted in 2007 in Katy, so we decided to make a side trip to the Porsche factory and the museum in Zuffenhausen. Now for those of you who have already made this trek, these comments will be old news, but for newbies like me this was a most enjoyable event. Although the badge on my hood says Stuttgart, the 911 is actually produced in Zuffenhausen, which is a suburb of Stuttgart.

The arranging of the factory tour took some doing, but was accomplished via email and anticipatory waiting. I didn't want to make any hotel arrangements until I knew for sure we had the tickets, but the approval finally came a few weeks before the trip. There are groups of tours and we were assigned a time and advised to not be late. to install the front and back windows. The tour takes about 2 hours and was very interesting. It made me appreciate my car all the more.

We met at the Porsche dealership, which is between the museum and the factory, although the factory is actually spread out a bit. We were not allowed to take pictures in the factory. We toured a number of stations to see how the cars are assembled. One of the recent directors of Porsche brainstormed with some Japanese car makers in order to improve the efficiency of the production process. When a car is ordered from the dealer, every car is unique and the order is bar -coded. Everything from that point on uses that barcode in the production process. We were told than in the U.S. many cars are bought off the floor from models that the dealers have selected, but in other parts of the world, most cars are custom ordered by the client and from that point it takes about 90 days for the individual to take possession. Once the barcode is activated to start the assembly and the chassis enters the assembly line, a signal is sent to the engine room and

the engine is assembled over the next several hours. It arrives at the assembly line at a time appropriate for installation. This is known as "just in time production" and has reduced storage time for engines and essentially all other items that require prior assembly. The engines are no longer hot tested which used some fuel and a radiator, but are now cold tested, which means some other device turns the engines over and the compression is tested by gauges in the injector openings. We saw how leather hides are scanned by a computer system and imperfections marked and cut out, so only the smoothest leather is used. Tires are inflated in a chamber that pushes the air in around the rim of the wheel, instead of through the valve stem, which would take too long. The workers go through a 3 year apprenticeship and then are hired for life. The only robot used is to install the front and back windows. The tour takes about 2 hours and was very interesting. It made me appreciate my car all the more.

The museum is spectacular and has a café and an elegant restaurant in it. The World Cup tournament was on during our stay, and German flags were everywhere. In front of the museum were three new Porsche 997's; black, red and yellow to represent the colors of the German flag.

There are many, many vehicles in the museum in fabulous condition. I thought one of the more interesting displays was the one for the Rothman's 956. In this display it was suggested that if a car could go fast enough, the law of downforce would allow it to be driven on the ceiling.

All in all, this was a most enjoyable day and I highly recommend the factory tour and Porsche Museum if you are planning a trip to Germany.

Airplane passengers tend to see flight attendants as people who help everyone find the right seat, and then serve drinks and food once the plane is in the air. Of course the whole airplane crew, including the flight attendants, has passenger safety as its primary responsibility.

At races as well as at high-speed drivers education events, drivers tend to see corner workers as people whose main job is to "Blue Flag" those pesky slower drivers out of the way. But of course, just as with that airplane flight, the whole staff of the event, including the corner workers, has driver safety as its primary responsibility.

Unlike flight attendants we don't generally have to tell drivers to fasten their seat belts...but at grid we do check for windows rolled down and about 43 other safety-related details. And once vehicles are on the track we are always watching for smoke, fluids dropping, as well as pieces of cars falling off. It is a key part of our job to help protect drivers from endangering themselves and others on the track.

For our DE events we have come to rely a lot on students from the Texas A&M car club for corner workers. They are smart, quick learners, responsible, local (no travel time or travel expenses), they are enthusiastic about doing the work, and they can make good use of the money we pay them. There are enough weekend events at TWS that for some of the A&M students, working weekends at the track is just about a part-time job.

Races are a whole different thing, whether you're behind the wheel of a high-performance Porsche, or behind the barrier at a corner station. So for our annual club race, we have been fortunate each year to be able to recruit a number of experienced SCCA corner workers. Almost every SCCA event they work is a race, so they have the level of race experience that we can draw on to run a safe and successful club race once a year.

The third group of corner workers is of course Porsche club volunteers, primarily from our own club, as well as from Hill Country and Maverick. These categories of workers begin to blur when you consider that a number of our workers are both PCA and SCCA members. PCA racing is somewhat different from SCCA racing, and our workers are able to "translate" between the two sets of rules for everyone's benefit.

If you have attended a previous club race, you probably didn't notice that any of this was going on. And that is just the way it is supposed to be. Just like the security guard at the bank, or the flight attendant on your last airplane trip, we corner workers are doing some of our best work when we are almost invisible.

But our goal is to be always ready, should an incident occur. We believe that Murphy prefers targets of opportunity, so it is by planning ahead that we have so far been successful, for the most part, in keeping him away from our events. And LSR's special offer to Green and Blue drivers this year (well heck, let's open it up to all club members!) is an invitation to

become part of the LSR Work / Drive program. Sign up at http://clubregistration.net just as you may have done in the past to drive in a DE. But this time, since it is the Club Race and there will be no Green or Blue run groups, sign up to work the event, rather than to drive in it.

We will be able to take a limited number of new volunteers for this event. We can only use one new volunteer per corner.

Finally, working corners will help you with your on-track driving performance at future events, will let you contribute to making the event a safe and successful one, and is a lot of fun.

I would like to start by letting you in on a conversation I had with a fellow chapter member prior to our first Time Trail.

Me: Hey did you see the notice regarding the Time Trail on October 9th? Fellow member (FM): I did, I love DEs. Me: No it's not a DE it's a Time Trial. FM: Oh yea, sorry, I haven't autocrossed in years but will give it a try. Me: It's not an autocross, it's a Time Trail FM: What the heck are you talking about?

What I am talking about is the most fun I have had in a long time driving my car. But first things first, if its not a DE and its not an autocross what is it? A Time Trail is

typically held on a road racing course in this case Grandsport Speedway South of Houston, it IS a timed event, and it IS competitive, very competitive judging from what I saw at the event. A Time Trail is run in accordance with DE event rules rather than autocross rules as it tends to have higher speeds and is run on a track.

Here is how our event worked; cars were placed into groups of three based on a driver's prior driving experience and car capability. Three drivers at a time were released on to the track approximately 20 seconds apart for a timed 6 lap session. There is no passing allowed, not even with a point by, if you catch up to another driver you come in to the pits and are given a re-run. Each of your six laps are timed and your best time is used to group you for an afternoon second session.

The afternoon session, well,,, did I mention

competitiveness, this is where cars/drivers are grouped by their best prior lap time? The groups of three are now very closely matched, everyone knows the course, the temperature is up so tires are a little sticker, and the competitive juices are flowing! The groups of three are again released approximately 20 seconds apart for another timed 6 lap session. Once released it is up to you and your car, can you find a faster line, get on the brakes a little later, the gas a little sooner, can you find those elusive few tenths of a second? It was the afternoon session I found to be so much fun, it was competitive like an autocross, but on the big track like a DE, for me a perfect combination! And, judging by the smiles and the conversations after the second session I don't think I was alone.

As I mentioned, this was our first time trail for the LSR PCA and as such we had less than full attendance, but I

think that those who came out will be back for our next event that is now being planned. For those who came out and watched and those who weren't sure about a Time Trail and did not attend, watch for the next event. Sign up for our next time trail and test your driving skills and car's capability. And, like all LSRPCA events its always fun to be around like minded car enthusiasts, for me the social aspects of our events are as fun as the driving.

If you go to our website, lsrpca.com, and click on Activities and then click on Time Trials you can view the results. Note the variety of cars that participated, how close the times were and the fact that a Porsche Boxster had the best time of the day! You see it's not just the car and its not just the driver, it how well the car is prepared and how well the driver and car mesh on a given day and a given track.

International Racing Elite to Compete in Porsche 911 GT3 Cup Race Car

Stuttgart/Atlanta - November 16, 2010 -- The Porsche 911 GT3 Cup is the most-produced race car in history. To date, over 2,000 vehicles have been delivered to customers around the world. And now, the 450 hp GT racer from Weissach belongs to the official competition cars at the Race of Champions, where a number of the world's most talented and famous racing celebrities from the most diverse disciplines come together in Dusseldorf, Germany on November 27 and 28.

Joining the ranks of the world class starter field is Porsche pilot Jeroen Bleekemolen. The 29-year-old driver from the Netherlands won the GTC class of the American Le Mans Series with Tim Pappas this season at the wheel of a 911 GT3 Cup and knows the car from many years of racing. In 2008 and 2009 he won the Porsche Mobil1 Supercup, the fastest international brand trophy series. In 2008 he earned a victory in the LMP2 class at the Le Mans 24 Hours with a Porsche RS Spyder.

In Dusseldorf, Bleekemolen will be up against the likes of Formula 1 pilots Michael Schumacher and Sebastian Vettel as well as World Rally Champion Sébastien Loeb and World Touring Car Champion Andy Priaulx.

"I'm proud to be part of the Race of Champions for the

first time," says Bleekemolen. "Obviously, I'm hoping to contest as many heats as possible with the Porsche 911 GT3 Cup - not one of the participating drivers knows the car like I do."

The Porsche 911 GT3 Cup, based on the road-legal 911 GT3 RS sports car, is powered by a 3.8-liter, six-cylinder boxer engine delivering 450 hp. The spectacular-sounding race exhaust system features a fully controlled catalytic converter. The rear-engine concept and the wide track give the racing 911 excellent traction and razor-sharp handling. Pilots operate the sequential six-speed gearbox manually. Power from the high-revving engine (max. 8,500 rpm) is distributed to the wide rear wheels via a mechanical differential.

"I'm very pleased that the racing elite from all over the globe will be seen driving the world's most produced race car, the Porsche 911 GT3 Cup," says Hartmut Kristen, head of Motorsport at Porsche. "I'm sure that fans and drivers alike will have just as much pleasure in the spectacular sound and the superb handling of this vehicle."

This marks the return of the Race of Champions to Germany since its first meet here in 1989. The event will be broadcast by the German national TV, ZDF. "Aktuelle Sportstudio" provides coverage on Saturday, with "Sportreportage" broadcasting the spectacular action from Dusseldorf's Esprit Arena on Sunday. 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
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
