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## Agricultural Excursions in Your Porsche – April Tech Tips

Sometimes, bad things happen to good cars. If you go to enough DE events, unless you are there only for parade laps, you will eventually take a scenic agricultural excursion off the paved surface. The distance of this agricultural excursion depends upon a number of factors, including your speed and how many times you say "Holy Sh#t" before coming to a stop.

Don't worry. It happens to everyone. The best thing is that someone always keeps an unofficial record of the longest agricultural excursions at every track, a sweet and very thoughtful bragging right even if you never have the best lap time.

If it has been raining, the odds of taking an agricultural excursion rise dramatically because

the persnickety molecules of rubber in high performance tires simply hate being exposed to rain; it is not in their job description, and in the "tug of war" with the asphalt, these molecules sometimes just "let go" to get back at you for forcing them to work in wet conditions.

So, if it has been raining, you could find yourself plowing through a muddy field with those fancy 20 inch, low-profile Porsche wheels that were never meant for mudding. (*Please See the section titled "Verboten" in your Porsche owner's manual.*) Here are some important things to remember:

- 1. *Before this ever happens*, put your tow hooks on, front and back, so the tow truck does not have to tear your bumper off to get you out;
- 2. If you go off, remember "both feet in";
- Don't steer left or right unless absolutely necessary as steering will only furrow those fancy wheels deeper into that dirty, gooey mud;
- 4. Once you stop, if you are okay, stick your arm out the window and give a "thumbs up" to the corner workers;
- 5. Gently try to drive the car forward, but don't spin the wheels and bury the car deeper in Texas clay mud that sticks like wet concrete. If the car won't move, wait for the tow;

6. Do not get out of your car. If you slid off that turn, someone else may slide off right into you. Also, if you get out of your car, chances are you will bury your feet and driving shoes in the mud;

7. After the tow truck gets you back on track, drive slowly

off-line as mud may be in all your calipers and the exhausts – take the oval at TWS to keep mud off the track (It is an adventure up there);

8. Back at the pits, *do not drive all over the pits dropping mud everywhere*. Stop at Black Flag and check the car up, down and all around for damage, and check the exhausts;

9. If the exhausts are clogged, use a long screwdriver and see if you can unclog them;

10. Wash your car thoroughly

top to bottom before you get back on the track. Make sure to wash all the mud and grass out of the calipers and off the wheels and tires. You will probably need a high pressure car wash.

11. Best of all, look around the car wash and enjoy a round of "thumbs up good buddy" from the monster truck guys who are already there. I highly recommend the Exxon car wash on Highway 6 in College Station for this experience.

Many thanks to the guys at Black Flag including Andrew Seifert, Glenn Campbell and Greg Stewart who helped me unclog the exhausts so I did not choke a flat six to a horrible death.

I promised Greg Platt that I would tell our readers in very bold print that our story about the "HIT AND MISS" - CUT N' SHOOT article was an April Fool's Joke. Obviously, no one in our club would use a Porsche for target practice. However, if we can get PCA National to cover us on insurance, maybe we could use go-karts.



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#### April 1, 2015



On April 1, 2015, LSR held its fifth annual "HIT AND MISS - CUT N SHOOT" Porsche Rodeo at the Houston Rodeo Arena. A combination of Autocross, Rodeo and target shooting, this was one of the most popular events in years and drew over 150 entries from across the Houston region. Chuck Morris, Texas Ranger, was the official scorer and Grand Marshal.

CUT AND SHOOT is the challenge. Basically, each Porsche is manned by a two-person team one driver and one shooter. Starting at opposite ends and racing toward each other around 4 barrels, like quarter horses at the rodeo, each Porsche team has 5 laps of the barrels to hit as many balloon targets as possible with a double action .45 revolver. Ammunition is strictly checked, and no hollow points are permitted to offer the fullest protection to participants and spectators. And, absolutely no shooting is allowed while the car is sideways or spinning so car control is critical. For safety reasons, only two cars are allowed on the course at one time.

Cars are separated into classes based upon on ease of targeting - Convertibles and Targas share the "C" class, sunroof cars are in the "B" class and the "A" class is reserved for full metal jacket Caymans and 911s where shooters can only use side windows. A special "Double Down Dukes of Hazard" class with front and rear shooters is reserved for Cayennes and four-door Panameras.

"HIT AND MISS" determines the winners. Scoring is simple and team-oriented. Take the number of





targets hit by each shooter and subtract double that number of seconds from the driver's total lap times. Bonus points are awarded for any unused ammo after all targets are shot, and any driver who hits a barrel is penalized 5 seconds. Hit three barrels or the other car with your team car and the team is automatically disqualified. Hit a spectator or another car with a bullet and the team is banned from competition. Ear protection and helmets are strictly required. Armored vests are optional, but highly recommended, as are steeltoed boots in case you shoot yourself in the foot. Gun mounts are prohibited, so the competition stays fast and furious.

This year's winners were Ken "Pistolero" Tubman and Mike "Wheelman" Globe who had a combined total lap time of 10:45 after Tubman hit fifteen targets with three shells remaining, and Globe didn't clip a barrel or anything else with his car for the first time in anyone's memory. As the winners were announced, the crowd raised all their guns in the air and fired off a Texas-sized salute. Yee-Hah.

Meeting called to order at 6:33 PM

Mike Globe calls the meeting to order and says Happy New Year to all.

Michael Shassere reports that the Hangar Hotel is 50% booked already and other back up hotels are booking up fast as well. Need to get your reservations done now if you plan on having a place to stay.

Ramez Botros reports on the clubs financial stability. For 2014 the club continued to thrive increasing its net assets by approximately \$26,000. This increase is due to several successful driving programs lead by the High Speed Drivers Education Program as well as two successful club Races and several Car Control Clinics, Tours and a growing Auto Cross Program. Our Concours events continue to grow and be highly successful as well as our Social events have largely been sold out.

Greg Platt reports Club Race is coming up in March and needs a lot of volunteers for Thursday/Friday for the Registration. He has a good list going for the rest of the time but needs help for those two days in particular.

Ron Baklarz reports that the USS Lexington tour is still in limbo waiting for update on the condition of the ship, the people there say they are still interested but need to make sure the ship is in good working order. We should know something next month.

Mike Phifer reports the Lone Star magazine is going to the printers next week. Asks Ramez to create an aged receivables for advertisers.

Steve Bukoski reports that the Car Control School event that cancelled for November due to weather, most of the registered migrated to February 2014 event. All 4 events for the coming year are scheduled and open for registration. FYI-he needs a replacement for himself, he needs someone to step forward and take over. Mike Phifer to put something in the Lone Star magazine as well. Bill Tutt reports that the last event at TWS should be held for instructors only. He presented his thoughts and what he figured that the expenses would be for the club to pay. 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#### March 13-15, 2015

Aptly named "The Last Rodeo", The Texas Two Step held by Lone Star Region PCA in March was the last time ever for Club Racing at Texas World Speedway. On Friday morning, it would have been hard to squeeze one more Porsche or trailer into the paddocks as drivers from across the country prepared for one last weekend of racing at a track rich in history. In 1973, Mario Andretti nailed down a world closed-course speed record of 214 mph at TWS, and




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in 1993, Jeff Andretti bettered his dad with an unofficial record of 234 mph. Legends who have won at TWS include Foyt, Unser, Rutherford, Waltrip, and Petty. After this June, only memories will remain, as the entry gates will be padlocked and bulldozers and jackhammers will tear down one of the seven remaining American Super Speedways.

As the weekend began on Friday the 13th, bad luck appeared as dark skies dropped intermittent rain that kept the track wet and cold, tow trucks busy and quality practice laps hard to get. On Saturday morning, the skies cleared early, and warm sunshine heated up the track with Joe Bank's GT3 Cup Car turning a 146:27 in the Red group. Although Joe turned the fastest lap time, Texan Lew Bouchier, with a little home field advantage, dominated the Red group on Saturday with a 6.74 second margin of victory in the last race of the afternoon. In E Class, Jim Buckley turned a best lap time of 1:53.5.

Over the weekend, a Texas-sized crowd got to see some exciting racing. Spectators were everywhere in the stands overlooking the grid as forty-five Porsches from Lone Star Region had convoyed to the track from Houston on Saturday to join the group already there. When the Saturday parade lap was lined up, it was over a hundred cars long.

In the Blue group, the racing was tight and competitive as twenty-one Spec Boxsters ran lap times within three seconds of the 1:57.28 posted by Thomas Jones on Saturday afternoon. After fourteen laps of racing, Jones had only a 1.847 second margin of victory over Mitch Butaud's "Twelfth Man" Boxster. Close lap times led to some close encounters, especially as cars dropped off the main straight side to side into the chute at Turn 1, but TWS has always been known as one of the safest tracks and that margin of safety held true over the weekend. Afterwards, the drivers and volunteers enjoyed some Texas hospitality and spirits at the Saturday night banquet as podium finishers were called out and congratulated.

As Greg Platt, Lone Star Region Race Chair, sat along the pit wall monitoring the races, he had just a little sadness in his tired eyes. Greg had very little sleep over the previous week, as he worked hard to make sure



everything was ready for racing, but it was obvious that he hated to see the last checkered flag drop at TWS. Located within just hours of Austin, Dallas, Houston and San Antonio, "seat time" at TWS was close, convenient and cheap. Ultimately, its location was its downfall as urbanization swallowed it up. One wonders how many more tracks will suffer the same.




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
