

Meeting called to order at 6:30 PM by Mike Globe

Greg Platt reported that the nominating committee discovered some voting irregularities and presented it to the board to show how it was done by a power point presentation. A summary of the nominating committee's findings follows:

As mandated by the LSR by-laws, the officers of the board are elected every year to serve a one year term. In the September meeting, the board appointed Greg Platt, Greg Fuller and Ken Tubman as the nominating committee. This committee was responsible for selecting a slate of candidates (write ins were also allowed) and for tallying the votes. Greg Platt was named chairman and, as webmaster, Greg Fuller would be responsible for tallying the individual votes. The committee presented its slate of candidates at the October meeting and voting began when the ballot was posted on home page of the LSR website on October 12. Voting continued until November 20. Over 150 votes were cast, which is over double of what we've seen in previous elections.

On November 18 (two days before the closing of the election period), Greg Fuller noticed that we had received several questionable votes. What set these votes apart was that many votes were cast from single IP addresses in a short period. Note that it is reasonable for a single IP address to cast up to four votes since only members and family members can cast votes and, usually, a single house can have up to four. Fuller was asked to review the entire voting results and report any votes that were cast from an IP address that cast more than four votes. He was to keep the actual voting results from those locations secret.

Fuller found that a total of 70 votes were cast within the last two days of the voting period from 5 different IP addresses. There were no locations with 5, 6 or 7 votes, but there were five locations with 8, 9, 14, 16 and 23 votes. For the most part, these votes were cast within minutes of each other. Platt then identified the location of all five IP addresses using a variety of internet resources. All such resources agreed on the IP address locations. These locations were:

- A private Houston Comcast customer. 5 votes cast within a short period on the evening of November 17 and an additional 3 cast the following morning (November 18).
- 2. The Houston Public Library System probably downtown. 14 votes cast from 1:16 to 1:38pm on November 18.
- 3. The Harris County Public Library in either Magnolia or Aldine. 9 votes cast from 2:00 to 2:09pm on November 18.
- 4. A server that is registered in Sydney Australia. 7 votes cast from 1:06 to 1:13pm and an additional 9 from 7:03 to 7:13pm on November 19.
- 5. A FedEx office in Addison, TX (DFW area). 23 votes cast from 4:14 to 4:45pm on November 19.

The nominating committee determined that the most likely reason for these votes to be cast as shown above was that one or more person was trying to stuff the ballot box. The thought of 23 LSR members gathering at a DFW FedEx office on a Thursday afternoon in order to cast their votes for our board election when such votes could have been cast from any location over a five week period simply did not pass the smell test.

Finally our Zone 5 rep, Lynn Friedman (who was called in to verify the PCA membership number of every vote cast), contacted five people whose PCA

membership numbers were associated with the questionable votes. Note that Lynn was the only person who had the names associated with the votes, but did not have access to the actual votes cast by those PCA numbers – only Fuller had that information. Three of the people she contacted indicated that they did not vote in the election at all, while the other two said that they voted either at home or work (in fact, the questionable votes associated with these two PCA numbers were the second votes each cast in the election). Therefore, all of the people contacted confirmed that they did not cast the questionable votes associated with their PCA number.

Platt presented this information to those attending the LSR board meeting on December 2. After the presentation, each of the five groups of questionable votes was voted on by all members present at the meeting. Each of the five sets of questionable votes was deemed to be fraudulent. There were no votes cast in favor of accepting any of the groups; all votes cast were to reject each of the five sets. Therefore, all of the questionable votes were removed from the tally and Fuller (who had several sets of tabulations prepared for whatever was decided) presented the results.

Greg Fuller reported the results of the election based on the allowed votes for the new officers of the 2016 term. They are as follows:

Greg Platt moves to accept the voted in officers and Steve Bukoski seconds the motion. All in favor and agreed to accept the votes as presented.

Mike Globe then presented the nominations for the chair persons as follows: Pamela Fitzgerald-Activities, Rick Franke-Membership, Ryan Lansford-Autocross, Andrew Seifert-DE, Tim Thomas-Event Registrar, Tomi Scantlebury-Charity, Greg Platt-Club Race, Tom Roy-Concours, Michael Phifer-Newsletter, Greg Fuller-Webmaster, Greg Platt-Past President, Patty Liles-LSR Store, Ron Baklarz-Tours, Alan Kendall-Car control, Hugh Brazier-Safety and Burnell Curtis-Technical Advisor. Greg Platt motions to approve, Walt Doyle seconds the motion and all are approved

Mike Globe also motioned for a committee to be formed to investigate how we can prevent this from happening in the future. Greg Fuller, Mike Phifer and Greg Platt have all volunteered to look into getting a new election process. Walt Doyle also volunteers to help the committee.

Greg Platt reports that Alan Kendall has offered to help with the Club Race since he will be out during that time due to surgery.

Alan Kendall reports that the Car Control School was very successful last month.

Mike Globe takes this time to thank Walt Doyle for his service and time as the exiting Vice President.

Ryan Lansford reports that the Autocross event had over 55 participants at each event and continues to be operating in the black. There will be one more event held before end of the year, the re-scheduled Grandsport Speedway event being held on 12/19/2015. This was re-scheduled due to it being rained out in October.

Tim Thomas reports that the DE event scheduled for this weekend, December 5-6 is at over 200 participants since they dropped the pricing to \$275

Mike Stein reporting on behalf of Andrew Seifert want to hold an open track day on December 12th and 13th at MSR Houston. This was taken to help build our relationship with MSR Houston. Right now only about 20 people are signed up but expect more. Mike Globe motions to approve the up to \$12,000 expense to hold the event and Ken Tubman seconds the motion, all approved and motion is accepted. Ken Tubman to do an e-blast to help promote this event.

Ron Baklarz reports that the annual Rockport Tour will be held next year on

February 6th and 7th. More details to follow and will put out an invite on Facebook too.

Pam Fitzgerald reports that the Christmas Party will be held at Maggiano's and that 104 people have already signed up. She has asked Ken Tubman to send out an e-blast once more just to make sure everyone is aware that it is still room for more.

Lynn Friedman reports that moving forward she is recommending that all clubs take a look at their by-laws to make sure they reflect what they do. Some of the by-laws are generic and don't reflect everything a club is doing so you need to make sure you have yours up to date. Autocross and Tours are getting guidelines for setting up procedures next year. They will be released sometime in January 2016. Also, the next Porsche Parade will be held in Jade Peak, VT and registration for lodging has already opened even though the event isn't scheduled till June 19th - June 26th. Please be sure to get your lodging set up now if you plan on attending. Oh and one more thing, need to have observer reports on ALL events that require insurance. This is a PCA requirement and they aren't seeing many from our region. Please be sure to submit those to PCA.

Meeting called to order at 6:31 PM

Mike Globe reports that he would like to start conducting our meetings in a more orderly and correct process especially when it comes to introducing new business. He handed out the Robert Rules of Order Cheat Sheet for everyone to review and to start the new process now. He also shares the news of Michelle Serrell's resignation and that she will continue to issue certificates till they can find a replacement, at least till next month. He reports that Greg Platt, Greg Fuller and Mike Phifer who are the voting committee are still working on solutions to the voting issues and how to fix them and what exactly went wrong. Greg Fuller is looking into new software for voting as well. Mike also reports that we do have a contract with TWS for the 2016 DE's through June 2016 and the Club Race March 2016.

Ramez Botros reports that the club is still financially sound and have had a modest increase over 2014 but doesn't have the final numbers yet. Hope to report next month

Rick Franke reports that we averaged about 30 new members a month. Our current membership is at 1,640.

Greg Platt reports Club Race preps are going on and will be asking for volunteers in a couple of weeks. Greg Platt moved to request \$380 to have the tire scales recalibrated for the Club Race. Ron Baklarz 2nd the motion, Amendment to \$400 to calibrate the scales, wants an even number. Ron Baklarz 2nd the motion again, asked for any discussion, none, discussion closed. Mike Globe calls for a vote to approve \$400 to calibrate the tire scales, all in favor, no objections and the motion was adopted.

Pam Fitzgerald reports the Christmas Dinner Party was a success with 126 people attending. The next dinner will be around February or March at Kim Son-Downtown Houston. Look for it out on Facebook. Mike moves to budget of up to \$6,000 for deposits of 6 social dinners. Greg Platt 2nd the motion. Discussion-Table this motion-will make it part of the social activities budget, written up with line items and expenditures for next month.

Patti Liles reports she has been having trouble getting apparel for the online store set up. But it is supposed to go live this week, 1/4/2016. Will get with Mike Phifer to write up an article to announce it.

Alan Kendall presents his Car Control School 2016 budget for \$11,000 for board approval. Ryan Lansford 2nd the motion to approve the Car Control School budget of \$11,000. Mike ask if there is any discussion, none. Mike calls for a vote to approve the 2016 Car Control School budget of \$11,000. All approve, no objections, motion to approve the \$11,000 Car Control School budget was adopted.

Mike Stein presents the 2016 DE Budget of \$206,000 to the board for approval. Greg Platt 2nd the motion, Mike Globe ask if there is any discussion. The board reviewed the budget by line and asked for an amendment to be made to the social line of the budget. Feel it is too low at \$4,500 should be closer to \$5,000 per event and ask for an amendment to the yearly LSR PCA DE event budget to \$5,000 from \$10,000. Amend motioned to amend the budget to \$204,.000 vs. \$206,000 originally proposed. Also noted that a revised budget reflecting these changes and to include income estimates should be given next month. Greg Platt 2nd the amendment. Mike Globe calls for a vote, all approved, no objections, motion to approve the 2016 DE Budget at \$204,000 was adopted.

Ron Baklarz reports that the Winter Tour to Rockport is coming up next month, February 6 & 7. Ron also presents his 2016 Tour budget of \$600 for board approval. Ramez Botros 2nds the motion. Mike Globe ask if there are any discussions, none. Mike Globe calls for a vote, all in favor, no objections and the motion to approve the 2016 Tour budget of \$600 was adopted

Jack Smythe asks the board to approve money for up to 2 free DE weekends for the annual Texas Repertory Theater and Auction Charity event. The Porsche Club has previously donated 2 free weekend and they always have a great response to them. Greg Platt seconds the motion to approve 2 free DE weekends for this charity event, Mike Globe ask for a discussions there were none. Mike calls for a vote to approve to donate the 2 free DE weekends gift certificates, all approve, no objections, motion to approve to donate 2 free DE weekend gift certificates for the Texas Repertory Theater motion was adopted.

Ryan Lansford presents his Autocross budget for 2016 of \$24,000. Greg Platt seconds the motion to approve the 2016 Autocross budget of \$24,000. Mike asks if there is any discussion, none. Mike Globe calls for a vote to approve the 2016 Autocross budget of \$24,000, all approve, no objections. The motion to approve the 2016 Autocross budget at \$24,000 was adopted.

Tomi Scantlebury says she will table her request for approval on her budget. She wanted to thank all the chairs that donated \$1,800 in stuff for the raffle items at last month's Christmas Dinner Party. They raised over \$1,157 for the Star of Hope.

Mike Globe motions to approve the 2015 December board minutes that everyone at the meeting was given a copy of. Greg Platt seconds the motion to approve the 2015 December board minutes. Mike Globe asks for any discussion, none. Mike calls for a vote, all in favor, no objections. The 2015 December board minutes motion is adopted.

Greg Platt moves to adjourn the meeting at 8:22 pm and Mike Globe seconds the motion and all approve to adjourn the meeting.

Mike proposed that the first order of business is to elect a new Secretary. Mike gave a short synopsis of how Kathy has been involved in PCA events in the past years. Mike moved that Kathy Kendall be nominated for Secretary. Greg Platt seconded the motion. No discussion. Unanimously approved, no abstentions. Mike suggested future meeting minutes focus on decisions, not individual comments.

Mike introduced Lori Mauer as the new candidate for Charity Chair. Responsibilities of charity chair are to organize events that would raise monies for charities that the LSRPCA club decide to participate in. Lori and Mike shared the view of enhancing Lone Star Region's image through more philanthropic plans. Magnificat House has been a recipient in the past, and the Charity Chair will make suggestions for other charities and events to be held. Events can be solely charity events or they can take place "within" other events. Steve Bukoski suggested a yearly plan for charity events be submitted, along with a list of charities that will benefit. The purpose is to make the community aware of what we do and what we give back to the community. Suggestions were made for involvement with Auto Cross, Car Control School and DE events. Entertain ideas that involve time and talent, ie donate to Texas Children's Hospital, help at animal shelters or weekend drives. Mike moved to nominate Lori for Charity Chair, Greg Platt seconded. Unanimously approved, no abstentions.

First order of business. Several budgets are ready for presentation (Activities and Lone Star). Mike will present them at a later date.

Greg Platt reported on the election committee.

On December 13, 2015, the Board formed an elections committee and assigned Greg Platt (Chairman), Greg Fuller and Mike Phifer as members. The election committee was assigned to determine to the best of their ability, what went on during the 2015 election, and to recommend to the board what steps should be taken to prevent a recurrence. The committee presented the following findings:

In the 2015 Officer Election, a total of 168 votes were cast. After those without correct PCA membership numbers and duplicate votes were removed, the total was 147. Of those 147, a total of 63 (after removal of incorrect PCA numbers and duplicates) were deemed to be fraudulent votes leaving 84 actual votes. The committee provided the board with information on who the fraudulent votes were for and also stated that the election committee could not confirm with certainty who had downloaded the member numbers used

in the fraudulent voting. The committee did note that one group of fraudulent votes were entered from the same IP address used by a member to register for a DE.

The election committee recommended:

- Limiting the number of <u>ClubRegistration.net</u> (<u>CR.net</u>) administrators and also limiting the amount of personal information that is available to administrators on CR.net. Also, all events' CR.net accounts should be password protected.
- Adopt voting software that can reduce fraud
- Clarify by-laws regarding elections and other out of date items

Greg Platt moved that the only CR.net Administrators be Chairs of events, treasurer, CDI, and registrar. Steve Bukoski seconded the motion. Discussion: need a list of who has access at the present time. Which positions have fixed authorization. CR.net can possibly separate out this information.

Greg Platt amended the motion: The only people who should have access are:

- Presiden
- Treasurer
- Auto Cross Chair
- Car Control Chair
- · Concours Chair
- Tour Chair
- Activities Chair DE Chair
- Club Race Chair
- CDI
- Registrar

All others need President's approval. We already do most of this, but need to formally state the rules.

Ryan seconded.

All in favor: 9 Against: 0

Abstain: 4

Second motion: Mike made a motion to work with Chris Alvarado to amend CR.net to limit the data available to administrators. Ramez Botros seconded.

Discussion was had concerning the need to have a person outline needs for CR.net Administrators for DEs. We need a deadline, a list and a task to give to Chris Alvarado. Mike tasked Andrew Seifert and Michael Stein to come up with this list: levels of admins, tasks, and levels of security needed.

WHAT KEEPS LSR RUNNING?

Honestly, when I arrived at our "Second Annual Last Rodeo" Club Race in early March, I was feeling a little jaded. But as I watched the weekend unfold, I started to see the real spirit of our club emerge.

This club runs on volunteers. A surprisingly small number of volunteers actually, but enough to get the job done, and done well. Autocross, Concours, Dinners, Charity, DE, Tours, Club Racing, GTG's, The Company Store, Car Control School, The Lone Star Magazine, and all of the administrative functions of the club are run by volunteers. The large amount of time that people put into keeping LSR running might surprise you.





TECH TIPS -

Why Regular Alignments are Important for Your Porsche.

Porsches are precision-engineered

Vehicles. Most Porsche owners are in-tune with their vehicles and can usually tell when their alignment is off. Some of the biggest questions I face are... Why do some shops charge 100 bucks while others charge over \$300? What is the difference in these alignments? I'll go over some basics of alignments first.

Houston streets take a toll on Porsches.
Living in Houston, many of us have seen the effects of deep potholes, cracked concrete, high curbs and pitted asphalt on vehicle alignments.
Constantly driving on rough roads will cause your

alignment to fall out of specification.

Proper alignment maximizes vehicle performance, tire life and fuel efficiency.
Regular alignments will prolong the life of your tires significantly and will improve fuel efficiency. A correctly aligned vehicle reduces rolling resistance on the road to accomplish the above.

Alignment machines and systems are not created equally. Shops can purchase alignment systems for less than \$5000 to upwards of \$70,000 dollars. Older systems are very basic and do not have the accuracy of newer systems, nor do they have the ability to interface with the vehicle's OBD port. Newer alignment machines typically utilize high-resolution cameras to view targets mounted on wheels to obtain more accurate wheel alignment.

Flush mounted alignment systems are better for lowered cars. Most alignment racks are surface mounted to reduce costs to the shop owner. This poses a problem for extremely low vehicles when entering the alignment rack. Specialty shops usually will flush mount their alignment systems into a floor pit that is even with the surface to enable easy entry of low


vehicles. Alignment systems also require regular updates to ensure they have the latest specifications.

Operator experience - who is operating the alignment machine? Extensive training is required to operate an alignment system correctly and to understand all the features it is capable of. The alignment machine is only as good as the operator using it. The goal is not always to get the number within the green specification. An operator must correctly understand what the underlying issue is with the vehicle before performing an alignment. A before and after test drive should also be done to verify that the alignment was performed correctly.

Alignment Adjustments: Toe, Camber and Caster. Three key specifications are adjusted when performing a four-wheel alignment.

VEHICLE TOE SETTING:

The most common problem noticed by the driver is the steering wheel not being straight. This is usually a problem with vehicle toe. Imagine standing upright




and pointing your toes directly forward. This would equate to a correct toe setting on your vehicle. Now, if you point your toes outwards or inwards, this would equate to your vehicle toe being incorrectly adjusted. Toe adjustments are the most common adjustment in a vehicle that the driver can feel.

VEHICLE CASTER SETTING:

The caster angle identifies the forward or backward slope of a line drawn through the upper and lower steering pivot points when viewed directly from the side of the vehicle. Caster angle settings allow the vehicle manufacturer to balance steering effort, high-speed stability and front end cornering effectiveness.


Increasing the amount of positive caster will increase steering effort and straight line tracking, as well as improve high-speed stability and cornering effectiveness. Positive caster also



increases tire lean when cornering (almost like having more negative camber) as the steering angle is increased.

VEHICLE CAMBER SETTING:

Camber angle identifies how far the tire slants away from vertical when viewed directly from the



front or back of the vehicle. This adjustment is one favored by track enthusiasts. Camber is expressed in degrees, and is said to be negative when the top of the tire tilts inward toward the center of the vehicle and positive when the top leans away from

the center of the vehicle. More negative camber helps grip the road during turns (i.e. around a track), however it wears the insides of your tires quickly.


My recommendation is to always get an alignment when replacing your tires or if you feel your vehicle is not tracking correctly. This can happen if you hit a pothole or curb. This ensures your new tires wear evenly. Make sure the shop you use is properly equipped and has trained personnel to handle your vehicle alignment.



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

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WHOOPING CRANES AND PORSCHES

LSR Tour Chair Ron Baklarz, and his lovely wife Anne, guided us down the Texas coast for a bird-watching expedition to Rockport.

arly Saturday morning on February 6th, we joined our Lone Star friends, 21 Porsches and 39 members, for a very well attended LSRPCA winter back roads tour down the Texas coast to Rockport. Departure from the Cracker Barrel in Pearland was at 8:30AM, so Edwin and I decided to arrive early for breakfast because it's no fun to drive on an empty stomach. After a delicious pancake breakfast, it was time to get together for the driver's meeting and start the Tour.

Every LSR Tour starts with a driver's meeting to explain the rules of the road and map out the stops along the way. The driver's meeting was at 8 A.M., and we left for Rockport at 8:30 sharp. Edwin and I were in the Lead Car of **Group 1**, a group that counted 11 beautiful Porsches. Jim and Wendy Ray were in the Sweep Car. In convoy, we drove the scenic route to Bay City where Group 1 took a quick pit stop, before arriving at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge.

It was a beautiful, sun-filled day at the Aransas Wildlife Refuge, where we planned to drive the sixteen-mile Auto Tour Loop. The 115,000-acre Refuge sprawls mostly across the Black Jack Peninsula, where grasslands, live oaks, and red bay thickets cover deep, sandy soils and provide a home to so many wild animals and birds along the southwest side of San Antonio Bay. Once we arrived, we were met and welcomed by the very friendly visitor's center employees. They showed us a short video about the Refuge, and asked us to honor a speed limit of 20 mph.

Primarily known for its whooping cranes, the Aransas Wildlife Refuge hosts the largest flock of wintering whooping cranes in North America with over 250 birds. The storms and waters of the Gulf of Mexico constantly shape this vital refuge, that is home to over 400 different bird species including cranes, egrets, herons, spoonbills and many other sea and shore birds. The Refuge also provides a home to a bunch of big Texas gators that often sun themselves along the

sides of the roadway, and is also a nesting spot for Kemp's Ridley sea

Driving with the top down made this sixteen-mile loop auto tour through the refuge filled with wintering whooping cranes even more spectacular. When we left the visitor's center, the friendly

employees were standing outside with their cellphones to film and photograph the Porsches driving by in convoy. Of course, it made all of us feel a little proud.



After this spectacular drive through the Refuge, we headed for lunch at Charlotte Plummer's Seafarer Restaurant that has been open since 1970 at the Fulton Harbor in Rockport. I had fresh seafood, a very delicious, larger than large Margarita (by mistake) and beautiful views shared with old and new Porsche friends.

Our Saturday night stay was in Rockport, with a nice dinner at the end of a fabulous day of driving. We stayed in the





Lighthouse Inn at Aransas Bay, as we had reserved our room long before so we would be assured of a seaside view. This upscale, bayside escape on the beautiful Texas Coast is a very relaxing and enjoyable boutique accommodation, and you can't get any closer to the water.











the great white whooping cranes. I was so happy there was no wind on Sunday, only blue sky. With a big smile on his face, the Charter Captain told us that the water had been pretty choppy the day before due to the 23 mph winds on Saturday; they won't do tours when the wind is 25 mph. Sunday was perfect for being on the water, though, with warm sunshine and lots of birds - long-legged, spiky-beaked, squawking, wings-a-flapping birds - to watch

So many people come to see these beautiful and rare birds that Port Aransas has celebrated the Whooping Crane Festival each year in late February for the past twenty years. The town brings experts and speakers to lunches and forums, organizes guided field trips and three hour, safari-like boat rides through the Refuge to peep in on these majestic red-hatted fellows. Wildlife painting classes, wine tasting and interactive seminars and workshops are also held. For more information, please go to whoopingcranefestival.org

After the charter boat tour, our Winter Tour to Rockport had come to an end. Many thanks to our awesome hosts Ron



Baklarz (LSR Tour Chair), and his lovely wife, Ann, who did a fabulous job of organizing, guiding and directing all of us





during this exciting tour and in such a friendly matter that we had an incredible time with our Porsche friends.

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






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
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
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
